The regular meeting of the Wellsville City Council was held on Wednesday, October 12<sup>th</sup> 2022 at 6:00 p.m. in the Wellsville City Council meeting room, located at 411 Main Street. Councilmen present were Chuck Rutledge, Scott Hutchinson, Luke Henry and Cory Cunningham. Department heads present were City Superintendent Darien Kerr, and Building and Codes official Pat Burton.

Councilwoman Nichole Pruitt was absent.

The pledge of allegiance and invocation were given.

Councilman Scott Hutchinson moved to approve the consent agenda and the minutes from the previous meeting. Councilman Luke Henry seconded. Motion passed 4-0.

Mayor Lytle opened the meeting up for public comments.

Paul Bean with the FCDC spoke to council and discussed Proximity Park and the leads that are coming in. November 10<sup>th</sup> is the Franklin County career day. It will be from 8:30-12:00 p.m. Lots of juniors will be going to the school in Ottawa to discuss careers and job opportunities.

Mr. McJilton who lives on Pendleton would like for Pendleton to be repaired. The State suggested getting with Casey's and have them partner with the City to fix the entrance onto Pendleton and Casey's. He also stated that the waterway back behind Pendleton and the apartments are overgrown and needs cleaned out.

Council consensus was for staff to gather some information and draft a letter to Casey's corporate to ask for assistance with the Pendleton Street.

County Commissioner Don Stottlemire gave the county report.

Fire Chief Robert Thomas gave the fire department activity report.

The special events application for Chili Jacks was brought before council for approval. The fundraiser will be from 3 p.m.-midnight on October 22<sup>nd</sup>.

Councilman Scott Hutchinson moved to approve the fundraiser on October 22<sup>nd</sup> from 3-midnight. Councilman Cory Cunningham seconded. Motion passed 4-0.

City Superintendent Darien Kerr gave the public works activity report. Darien stated they are seeing more water leaks due to the dry weather. Darien said that the lead and copper mapping is \$43,547 and it is a requirement for 2024. It includes new water, sewer maps and the lead and copper study.

Council had some questions on payment time frames and when the company could start the process.

Councilman Scott Hutchinson moved to adjourn the meeting. Councilman Luke Henry seconded. Motion passed 4-0.
